
## Was Blitz Spirit real in World War Two?

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Those eight months were a time of remarkable resilience, and of terrible suffering. Yet our clichéd images of the Blitz - jolly singalongs in the air raid shelters- don't tell the whole story. The government issued propaganda declaring that "London Can Take it" but would these ordinary people have agreed? Londoners experienced a whole spectrum of doubt and despair as well as the courage and resilience about which we more often hear. And it's hard to generalise: every person had their own unique experience of the Blitz.
