



Section 1 Melodrama – a brief history

It is a dramatic form which uses **exaggerated** plot elements and characters (often stereotypes or 'stock') in order to appeal to the **emotions** of the audience.

Originally, in the 18th and 19th centuries, melodrama referred to the specific form of theatre where **orchestral music** or **song** were used to accompany the action to add to the **emotional and dramatic effect.**

The term originated from the early 19th-century French word *mélodrame*, which comes from the Ancient Greek words *melos* (music) and *drān* (to do or perform).
